Friday Part of Psalm 69 and a reading from Romans

I Save me, O God,  $\blacklozenge$  for the waters have come up, even to my neck.

2 I sink in deep mire where there is no foothold;
I have come into deep waters and the flood sweeps over me.

3 I have grown weary with crying; my throat is raw; my eyes have failed from looking so long for my God.

13 Those who sit at the gate murmur against me,  $\blacklozenge$  and the drunkards make songs about me.



Reflection



Reflection 3.4.20

The stations of the cross is a relative new concept to me – having grown up in a very different tradition.

But this year in particular it is good to have some structure and focus during Passiontide. Today the station is Simon of Cyrene carries the cross.

What do we know about Simon?

• He is mentioned only 3 times - in Matthew, Mark and Luke very briefly as the man who was sized from the crowd and forced to carry the cross

• Condemned prisoners had to carry their own crosses to the execution site, and as Jesus weakened from the beatings he received was physical unable to carry it any further

- Simon was from Cyrene in north Africa, probably one of the 1000s of Jews visiting for the Passover, he is often depicted as a dark skinned African
- It was nearly 900 miles between Cyrene and Jerusalem, the journey would have taken several weeks
- We can be sure that Jesus was grateful to Simon for providing some relief during the passion
- Simon was also part of the plan in helping Jesus reaching his goal of redeeming humanity by his suffering and death
- Luke's version "after laying the cross on him, they made him carry it **behind** Jesus"
- from what we know from Roman crucifixions it seems likely only the transverse beam was carried as the vertical beam was already at the crucifixion site. Paintings often show the whole cross.

Carrying our cross is quite a familiar concept to Christians, we tend to associate it with physical ailments or challenges, difficulties, illness or distress. Carrying our cross is the cost of a true disciple. Mark 8 v 34 says "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me."

Here Jesus is talking about the effort needed to follow him moment by moment to do his will even when the work is difficult, and the future looks bleak.

Simon carried the cross behind Jesus, was it a burden for Simon? We don't know. It was a surprise, not what he had expected

As we walk our Lenten journey, let's learn from Simon, who did something, simple, kind, unexpected, emotionally draining, helpful and ultimately made a difference.


I read a short article about Terry Waite yesterday who for 1763 days was a hostage in appalling conditions. His message for our present situation is, stop complaining, change your mindset, you are not stuck at home, you are safe at home. His advice is – keep your dignity get out of your pjs, form a structure to your day, be grateful for what you have, shelter, home, possessions etc. Read and be creative.

Today we are walking two journeys – Passiontide and a pandemic.

What links the 2 – the cross of Christ, carried by Simon and preached the world over. Let's today walk closer to Christ but also be the church, be Christ to the people around us. Like Simon we just don't know what we will be asked to do. But this cartoon from last week's Church times sums it up beautifully.

Bring comfort to the dying, and gladden their hearts with the vision of your glory: **God of love, hear our prayer** 

Give rest to the departed and bring them, with your saints, to glory everlasting: **God of love, hear our prayer**  Let us commend the world, for which Christ died, to the mercy and protection of God.

Collect - Week One:

Most merciful God,

who by the death and resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ delivered and saved the world:

grant that by faith in him who suffered on the cross

we may triumph in the power of his victory;

through Jesus Christ our Lord.

### Amen.

Standing at the foot of the cross, as our Saviour taught us, so we pray

**Our Father in heaven,** hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. **Forgive us our sins** as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.
